





How to Print, Fold, and Use Your Cuyama Pattern Hunter Guides

A brief explanation on how to use *Cuyama Pattern Hunter Guides / Guías Para Cazadores de Patrones* as educational tools or self-guided coloring books, as created in March 2019 by visiting artist Claudia Borfiga.


①  Photocopy your master copy onto blank 11x17 paper. Follow the instructions below for each copy you make.


②  Fold the sheet in half, hot-dog style.

③  Then fold the sheet in half, hamburger-style.

④  One more time, fold the sheet in half, hamburger-style.

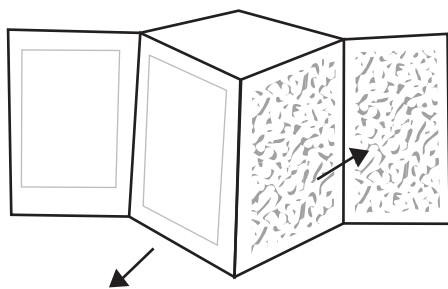
Unfold the sheet completely.

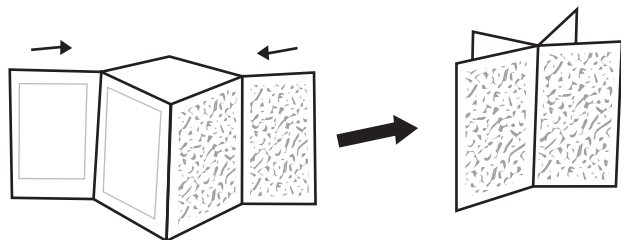
Using scissors or an exacto knife, cut a slit along the center line (see dashed segment).

Fold again, hot-dog style. At the slit, pop open the center panels.

Holding onto the left and right edges, push inwards towards the gap until you form four folds.

Finally, fold hamburger-style so that the title pages (both english and spanish) form both the front and back covers of your booklet.

Use your new Pattern Hunter Guides with youth, adults, and students! If you'd like to form a lesson around pattern hunting, start by asking your class questions to prompt them to notice pattern. Here are a few example questions:



- What is a pattern?
- Do you have any patterns on your clothes?
- Do you see any repeating colors, shapes, or lines from where you're sitting or standing?
- Can movement make pattern? (Have them try doing "the wave" or make other patterns with their bodies.)
- What kinds of patterns make the Cuyama Valley special?

Then, let your students use the guides as a tool pattern hunt—exploring and looking closely at their surroundings!

Or, leave some guides and crayons out for kids to independently entertain themselves while visiting your organization, business, or home!
